We saw many practices that are already operating in our school, as well as other strategies that we can, and will, implement to enhance the achievements of our students.

Science Week

This week is Science Week and I would like to acknowledge Mrs Binedell and the team of teachers who have led this week's events, providing a wonderful set of experiences for the children. This has included the 'Science in Classrooms' activity which will identify our top scientists across the school. These scientists will be presented with awards at assemblies towards the end of the term.

Other activities have included the colouring competition for our Kindergarten and Pre-Primary students and recycled material construction challenges across the rest of the school along with a science-based quiz. I also hope families will take the opportunity to enjoy the Shipwreck Car Rally in the coming weeks. Our Year Six students participated in the Adventure Quest Incursion this week, with a strong focus on team building. The children clearly enjoyed the experience, which was one of two activities provided in lieu of the school camp, which was cancelled due to COVID-19.

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Rhyme Time and Story Time

I'm very pleased to announce that both Rhyme Time and Story Time have recommenced and will continue on Wednesday mornings from 8.45am in the Library. This program provides important early learning experiences, exposing children to concepts around narrative, how stories are structured, to phonemic awareness and the ability to hear different sounds in words, skills that are critical to early success in school. It's also an opportunity for children to interact with peers and adults to enhance their social skills.

INTRODUCING.... LOOSE PARTS PLAY!

We are excited to soon be commencing 'Loose Parts Play' at Currambine Primary School.

What is Loose Parts Play?

Loose Parts Play is a type of play that supports invention, divergent thinking, problem-solving and offers a sense of wonder to children. Loose Parts can be anything that can be moved, redesigned and combined to encourage creative play. Loose Parts are open-ended, there's no right or wrong way to play with them. A stick, for example, may become a fishing rod near real or imaginary water. A rock might be used as a phone, a building block or a cookie. A child's imagination, creativity and desire are used to give purpose to an item that may once have been rubbish to us.

What are the benefits of playing with Loose Parts?

Loose Parts Play is about real-world learning. It has many benefits, including improving their problem solving, decision-making, cooperation, negotiation, creativity and story-telling skills.

Loose Parts create richer environments for children to play, giving them the resources they need to extend their play. Loose Parts aren't prescriptive and offer limitless possibilities. It provides an environment they can manipulate and where they can invent, construct, evaluate and modify their constructions and ideas through play. The list of possible loose parts is endless but can include:

- natural resources – such as straw, mud and pine cones
- building materials and tools
- scrap materials – old tyres, off-cuts, and
- randomly found objects.

Loose Parts Play at Currambine Primary and how you can help.

Our Loose Parts Play area will be located in the space behind the spider web playground and there will be a roster for different year levels on different days.

- Small or even medium to large pieces of wood
- Large electrical cable, hose or chain spools
- Sand
- Large containers to hold sand or water
- Plant seeds
- String or rope

FAMILIES have been exploring Perth's coast as part of a 'shipwreck car rally' event for National Science Week.

Currambine Primary School's science-loving teachers created the rally to encourage families to explore the coastline from Two Rocks to Fremantle.

Spokeswoman Casey Bryden said families could complete the rally at their leisure, following clues to find 'hidden treasures' in the history, tales, geographical and biological information, and the wrecks.

"The idea sprouted from the teachers desire to help families explore and investigate our coastline while social distancing," she said.

"Shipwrecks ignite children's imagination and it's hoped that this informal and fun style of learning will get families excited about learning about our coastline and how we can care for it in the future."

The rally included the City of Wanneroo's [shipwreck trail signs](#) for [Alex T Brown](#), Alkimos, and Vergulde Draeck, as well as the Marmion Marine Park and the WA Shipwrecks and Maritime museums.

National Science Week runs until August 23 and this year's theme is 'Deep Blue: Innovations for the future of our oceans'.

It aims to encourage workable solutions to create and maintain healthy oceans as well as embracing the technologies, capabilities and skills needed to ensure oceans are sustainable.

DEEP SEA ADVENTURES AT AQWA WITH TA16

On Wednesday 19th of August students, staff and some parent helpers from Pre-Primary went on an adventure to The Aquarium of Western Australia (AQWA) to celebrate and support Science Week 2020 and the Biological Science program.

First, we went on the bus and were met by AQWA's 'Ocean Guide,' Shan. Shan told us all about AQWA and the things we would see. Next, we took turns exploring the 'Danger Zone', 'Touch Pool', 'Underwater Journey' (the tunnel), 'The Coral Coast' and 'The Marina'. We had so much fun and learnt so much about our ocean animals and how we can help protect them.

Here are a few students from TA16 to tell us their favourite part;

Layla: "We went on a travelator when the floor was moving and I saw the Nemos and Dorys."

Kobe: "My favourite part was the starfish (sea star) because we were allowed to touch them."

BICYCLE HELMETS WORK!

Did you know that Australia was actually the first country in the world to make it mandatory to wear a bicycle helmet?



Helmets are incredibly important. Research shows that since the introduction of mandatory wearing of helmets the death rates from cycling accidents have dropped dramatically. Helmets work!

According to Bicycle Queensland: "Wearing a helmet reduces all head injuries in the event of an accident by about 69%, and serious head injuries by about 75%, including skull fractures and intracranial injury and bleeding in the brain."

We'd like to encourage parents to set a good example by wearing your helmets too, and also ensure that helmets are correctly fitted. When wearing a helmet use the 2V1 rule. The helmet should be no more than two fingers above the eyebrows, the side straps should be fitted close to the ears to make a V and you should be able to fit one finger under the chin strap, too loose and it is useless.

To assist students with correctly fitting their bike helmets, one of our Phys Ed teachers, Mrs Brooks, will be conducting helmet checks before school on Wednesday and Thursday mornings in Week Six and Seven at the bike racks.


As the weather improves, we hope to see more students embracing the Your Move ethos and selecting active travel alternatives to get to school!

EV3 LEGO ROBOTICS IN TA32



On Monday and Tuesday, TA 32 and TA 33 had two full days of Lego Robotics. We used a coding app to make this possible.

On Day One we started off with seven missions. The first one we had to make the robot make different faces on the screen while displaying sound. The second mission was called moving your robot. What we had to do in this mission was to move our robot forward and then move it backwards. The next mission was, of course, the third mission. This one was called turning your robot. We had to complete three different 360° turns. Then we had... Mission Four! It was probably the hardest for most groups. Mission Four was called 'Drive to Create the Perfect Square'. In this, you had to make four perfect 90° turns. Mission Five was pretty straight forward. It was called, 'Stop When Object Detected'. You had an Ultrasonic Sensor on the robot and that was used to detect motion and objects. Mission Six was called 'Detect Colours'. We used a Colour Sensor for this. You coded for a colour and when it detected the colour it would say the colour that the brick was. Lastly was Mission Seven. We had a touch sensor that some people had to attach to the EV3 robot. After that, you had to code the robot so that when you touched this little red button the robot would start moving according to your code. After Monday, everyone went back to their house and came back the next day.

On Day Two we had to complete our drivers' license, even though we are 10, 11 and 12 year olds and you have to be 16 years old to get your drivers' license, but this is no ordinary license this is your, wait for it... EV3 DRIVERS LICENSE!!!

In this lesson, the teachers gave each class a mat that we used to test our robot and to see if we passed and got our driver's license. We started off by touching the robot on its little red button as we told you about on day one. Then it had to go up to the cross walk where we put our hand down and it then stopped and said something when you lifted your hand up. It would start moving for a second or two, then had to make a left turn, drive for a few seconds and then turn left again. It would go forward for a few seconds, then reverse backwards into a parking spot. If you got that completed you would earn your EV3 driver's license.


