School Board

School Board Explained

The purpose of the School Board is to enable staff, parents and members of the wider community to engage in activities that will advance the efficacy of the School and the interest of students.

The Board's work is strategic, rather than operational, and takes part in reviewing the objectives, priorities and general policy direction of the School, with particular attention to the approval of the School Business Plan every three years. Members who join the School Board, are expected to hold the full tenure of three years, within reason.

The School Board is required to have six parent representatives and two community representatives. The latter are not to have children enrolled at the School.

Vacant Positions

Five Board positions will become vacant for parents at the close of Term Two, 2024.

A specific nomination process will be advised closer to the time, and the School wishes to inform the community in advance of the arising vacancies.

Parents are encouraged to learn more about the responsibility of joining the School Board and consider nominating for the role. The School Board meets once per term, on a Wednesday evening in Week Eight. The only exception to this, is a second meeting held in Term Four Week Four.



Chemical Science

Term One has flown by for Year Three class TA42. This term we have been learning about States of Matter in Chemical Science.

We have learnt that there are three states of matter, that are all around us, and they all take up space. Through its properties we discovered a state of matter can be classified as a solid, liquid or gas, and they are all made up of atoms.

During the experiments, conducted heat was added or removed to solids and liquids. We then observed and recorded if the state of matter changed from one state to another.

In TA42 we have enjoyed learning about the states of matter that surround us.



World Autism Awareness Day

Tuesday 2nd April is World Autism Awareness Day. The message of Autism Awareness Day is "To help create a world in which autistic individuals are fully supported, championed and celebrated, we must all work together to achieve true acceptance."

What is Autism?

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a lifelong neurological condition that manifests during early childhood. Autism is mainly characterised by its unique social interactions, non-standard ways of learning, keen interests in specific subjects, inclination to routines, challenges in typical communications and particular ways of processing sensory information. The rate of autism in all regions of the world is high and the lack of understanding has a tremendous impact on individuals, their families, and communities.

World Autism Awareness Day (WAAD) aims to put a spotlight on the hurdles that people with autism, and others living with people with autism, face every day. It is designed to help increase and develop world knowledge of children and adults who have autism spectrum disorder (ASD). WAAD goes one step further to celebrate the unique talents of those with autism, while putting a huge focus on the warm embrace and welcome that these skills deserve, through community events around the globe.



Comments from parents/carers of ASD students at Currambine Primary School:

Autism can be a superpower but it is also isolating. Please think twice and invite that odd child to your child's birthday party.

My child had NO party invitations in Year Three.

They don't mean to hurt or invade space. They might just be focused on an object or wanting attention.

Neurodivergent individuals (including autistic individuals) are as unique as neurotypical individuals.

Autism has so many characteristics. Don't ever judge a child or their family. You never know what's happening or what struggles people are facing.

Our differences make the world an interesting place.

Don't judge by social norms.

Mrs Veness was particularly delighted to win a prize in the raffle, commenting that it is the first prize she has won in over 20 years!


Faction Carnival Thanks
